Kevin Hines has gone one to become an award-winning global speaker, bestselling author, documentary filmmaker, and suicide prevention and mental health advocate who has reached millions with his story of an unlikely survival and his strong will to live (www.kevinhinesstory.com).

He was awarded a Lifetime Achievement Award by the National Council of Behavioral Health. Kevin has also been awarded by SAMSHA as a Voice Awards Fellow and Award Winner, an Achievement Winner by the US Veterans Affairs and is a recipient of several military Medals.

Kevin's will to live and stay mentally well has inspired people worldwide. Thousands have communicated to Hines that his story helped save their lives. Kevin believes in the power of the human spirit and in the fact that you can find the ability to live mentally well. His mantra: "Life is a gift, that is why they call it the present. Cherish it always."

Assessing for Underlying Medical Causes of Behavior in ASD

Friday, June 10 3:00 Celebration 8

Medical issues do contribute to maladaptive behaviors in those with ASD and related conditions. It is not always evident when there is pain or dysfunction. Participants will learn how to assess for common underlying medical conditions that have been well documented to occur with a diagnosis of autism. These co-morbidities, as they are called, can be treated if identified. Appropriate medical care often cannot be accessed through traditional models of service delivery for those on the autism spectrum. There is a lack of understanding of the disability and knowledge deficits on the part of traditional medical providers about the neurological and multi-system problems associated with autism. It is critical to assess for medical problems to rule out possible physiological causes of maladaptive behaviors before attributing behavioral issues to lack of attention or non-compliance. As a result of severe communication difficulties, motor impairments, and total lack of



body awareness experienced by some people, especially those on the more severe end of the autism spectrum, this assessment can be difficult even for experienced clinicians. Parents and caregivers must be the drivers to advocate for their loved one in the medical arena to ensure comprehensive medical care. Teachers and therapists play a vital role as well to help distinguish the functions of behavior and to be a resource for referrals that may be needed to meet their clients' individual needs.

Personal Learning Scholarship Accounts (PLSA) for Students with Specific Diagnosis

These include schools, therapists, specialists, curriculum, technology—even a college savings account. This scholarship is for Florida students 3 years old through 12th grade or age 22, whichever comes first, with one of the following disabilities: autism spectrum disorder, muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, Prader-Willi syndrome, Spina bifida, Williams syndrome or intellectual disability (severe cognitive impairment). Also, students in kindergarten deemed "high risk" due to developmental delays and not older than 5 on Sept. 1 may be eligible for the year they apply. Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Focus Group for Youth and Young Adults and Key Stakeholders


