

Welcome to the 26th Annual Family Cafe and Governor's Summit on Disabilities. This innovative event brings together individuals with disabilities and their families to share information and network. The Florida Department of Education (FDOE) is committed to providing access to world-class education options for all of Florida's nearly 2.9 million students.

Florida continues to prioritize protecting parents' rights, investing in educators, enhancing access to services and working to increase student achievement

FDOE is a national leader in education, as demonstrated by recent performance:

- The 2022 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) results demonstrate Florida's continued commitment to the education of students with disabilities. Florida Florida's continued commitment to the education of students with disabilities. Florida ranked in the top 5 for average scale scores of students with disabilities in grades 4 and 8. Florida's students with disabilities also ranked number one in Grade 4 Reading and
- Orace 4 Mathematics.

 The high school graduation rate of Florida's students with disabilities continues to increase, with 85.5% graduating in 2022-23. This is an increase of 19.5 percentage
- points since 2010-17.
 Florida was ranked #1 overall by the Heritage Foundation on the 2023 Education Freedom Report Card. Florida remains the top-ranked state across the board. Governor DeSantis and the Florida Legislature have expanded education freedom and promoted parents' rights while creating laudable returns on investment for taxpayers.

In 2021, the Gardiner Scholarship and John M. McKay Scholarship were consolidated and renamed the Family Empowerment Scholarship for Students with Unique Abilities (FES-UA).

- FES-UA is designed to offer families of students with disabilities, as young as three years of age, access to additional educational resources.
- Families may choose to enroll their student in another public school or take the opportunity to receive a personal education savings account (ESA) for their student. opportunity to receive a personal education savings account (ESA) for their student. With an ESA, parents deposit public funds into government-authorized savings accounts with restricted but multiple uses instead of having their child attend a public



approved customized learning services and materials.

Families apply and annually renew participation in FES-UA through one of the approved scholarship funding organizations responsible for determining eligibility, approved scholarship funding organizations responsible for determining eligibility awarding and distributing funding to eligible student accounts and approximately all approximately approximate approved scholarship funding organizations responsible for determining eligibility, awarding and distributing funding to eligible student accounts and approving eligible

expenditures.

For the 2023-2024 school year, 83,941 students received the FES-UA, with an average and otherwise worth about 60 800



We Are All Worthy, Always


The Family Café welcomes Marlene Sallo, Executive Director of the National Disability Rights Network and parent to a child with a disability, to The 26th Annual Family Café. She is the first woman, the first Latina, and the first person with a disability to lead NDRN, the nonprofit membership organization for the federally mandated Protection and Advocacy (P&A) Systems and the Client Assistance Programs (CAP) for individuals with disabilities.

Before joining NDRN, Sallo served as Director of Preventing Targeted Violence at the McCain Institute for International Leadership; Executive Director of the Massachusetts Disability Law Center (DLC), the federally designated Protection and Advocacy agency for Massachusetts; and an education attorney with Disability Rights Florida, providing protection and advocacy to students with disabilities and children in the state's child welfare system. In 2013, President Barack Obama appointed her to serve as staff director of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, and she also worked as chief of staff and senior counsel at the U.S. Department of Justice Community Relations Service.

Join Marlene for a conversation about what "accessibility" and "accommodations" truly mean when it comes to the education and support of children and youth with disabilities. While these terms are often used in reference to individual changes to a classroom, curriculum, or learning environment, Marlene encourages

families and advocates to think about them in the larger context of ensuring that our children, youth and young adults are welcomed into a culture of equity and justice. Every instance of accommodation or accessibility offers a chance to create a sense of acceptance for

students, and to ensure that they always feel that they belong. Accommodations in learning environments are fundamental to the education of students with disabilities, but it is also essential that the students the system accommodates come away with the understanding that we are all worthy, always.





Routine-Based Learning for Students with Visual Impairments

Routine-based learning that occurs in a natural environment, including the home, provides the most effective way to teach early intervention activities for very young learners and students with multiple impairments with a visual impairment. Skills learned are functional and significant for children and their caregivers when developmental interventions are embedded in children's regular routines and activities. Children learn new skills because they are predictable, functional, and arise multiple times throughout the day. Parents and guardians can focus on scaffolding additional, more complex learning based on what their child has previously mastered. When all team members working with a student use daily routines as the basis for a child's interventions, they can integrate learning activities without disrupting the flow of what children are naturally doing and learning. Embedding early intervention activities into routines and activities in the home results in increased skill development for young children with special needs or developmental delays.







The Opioid and Addiction Crisis


The Family Café welcomes physician, advocate, and person in recovery from opioid and benzodiazepine addiction, Dr. Stephen Loyd for a conversation about opioids and addiction.

Dr. Loyd, who is an Internal Medicine/Addiction Medicine physician and Vice-President of the Tennessee Board of Medical Examiners, was the Assistant Commissioner (Opioid Czar) for Substance Abuse Services in the Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services. He gained national notoriety in 2021 with the release of the television series *Dopesick*, in which Michael Keaton portrayed a character based in part on his life story.

He has served as an expert witness in more than twenty federal and state cases against physicians who were improperly prescribing controlled substances, and was named an Advocate for Action by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), an office of the President of the United States.

Dr. Loyd was an original member (still active) of the Treatment of Chronic Pain Guidelines Committee which defined pain treatment for providers in the state of Tennessee. He has worked as an Addiction Medicine Physician in both the inpatient and outpatient settings, specializing in the treatment of opioid dependent pregnant women. Dr. Loyd has served on multiple drug courts in Tennessee, has worked with multiple community level anti-drug coalitions from Johnson County to Shelby County, and has worked with all levels of state law enforcement, mainly the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation. He currently serves as Chief Medical Officer for Cedar Recovery in Tennessee and is the current Chair of the Tennessee Opioid Abatement Council appointed by current Tennessee Governor Bill Lee.

Dr. Loyd has been in recovery from opioid and benzodiazepine addiction since July 8, 2004, and has delivered over five hundred educational lectures on addiction and treatment of opioid use disorder and proper prescribing of controlled substances.

SibShops are evidence of their loving concern for the family member who will have the longest-lasting relationship with a person who has a disability. For the kids who attend them, SibShops are lively, pedal-to-the-metal events where they will: meet other sibs (usually for the first time); have fun; talk about the good and not-so-good parts of having a sib with special needs with others who "get it"; play some great games; explore how other brother and sisters handle sticky situations sometimes faced by brothers and sisters; laugh; learn about the services their brothers and sister receive; and have some more fun! Ages: 7-13. Most Sibshops are for sibs of kids with special developmental concerns, including intellectual and developmental disabilities. Increasingly, SibShops are being offered for brothers and sisters of kids with health concerns (often at children's hospitals), and we're beginning to see SibShops emerge for sibs of kids with mental health concerns. Please note this is not childcare and is intended for the sibling. Typically, parents do not stay during the session. We find this allows children to speak freely without fear or judgment.

- Disputes involving Medicaid, SSDI, and SSI eligibility;
- Discrimination in housing, architectural barriers, effective and accessible communication, service animals, employment, vocational rehabilitation, and access to programs and services;
- Abuse, neglect, and rights violations in an institution, prison or jail;
- Access to mental health and support services that provide individualized treatment;

- Rights to a least restrictive environment, community integration, privacy, choice, dignity, and other rights;
- Barriers to a free and appropriate education,
 K-12 special education, transition services,
 and post-secondary education;
- Investigation of stolen or misused funds, exploitation, or neglect by representative payees;
- Voting registration, vote casting, and accessible polling places;
- Access to assistive technology;
- Supported Decision-Making as an alternative to guardianship.


